Mission

The mission of the Kent County Drain Commissioner's office is to improve and maintain storm water drainage for the public health, safety, convenience, and welfare of the citizens of Kent County and also to be an effective and efficient steward of our natural and fiscal resources.

Overview

The County Drain Commissioner is elected to a four-year term to perform a number of duties assigned by State law. The office of the Drain Commissioner is responsible for the administration of the State Drain Code as it applies to the receipt of petitions for the establishment, improvement or maintenance of over 558 miles of County Drains and 357 storm water detention ponds in Kent County. Under the Subdivision Control Act, this office reviews storm water plans for all plats developed within the County and maintains records on over 1,800 developments. Other duties include the administration of 19 court established lake levels under the Lake Level Act, participation in the NPDES Phase II program, participation on lake improvement boards, maintenance of the GIS system as it pertains to County Drains and the resolution of citizen complaints and requests for service.

This department and its staff of five responds to requests from municipalities, citizens and property owners for assistance in addressing flooding and surface water drainage.

Strategic Goals

- Administer the Drain Code (act 40, PA of 1956) as it pertains to the establishment and maintenance of drains in Kent County (Efficient Use of Resources).
- Administer the Subdivision Control Act (act 288, PA of 1967) as it applies to stormwater management (Safe Community).
- Administer the Lake Level Act (Part 307, Act 451, PA of 1994) as it pertains to the establishment and maintenance of lake levels in Kent County (Efficient Use of Resources).

Significant Accomplishments

- This office received and responded to 149 requests for service to the County Drains in 2016 and 163 requests for service so far in 2017, 138 of which have been completed.
- Wind damages caused by trees falling into County Drains were repaired throughout the County, particularly in Wyoming, Byron Center and Sparta, which generated enough work that five contractors have been kept busy through 2017. In total, drains totaling 16 miles were cleared due to storms.
- Provided leadership and assistance for the remediation of the damage to the Little Thornapple Inter-County Drain, working closely with Barry and Ionia Counties.
- Worked with the IT GIS team to place requests for service on a real time electronic system to process service requests (using IPads and Surface tablets), which significantly increased efficiency. Phase one of the technology project began in July 2017.
- Purchased a John Deere Gator so drain inspections through fields and wetlands are now done thoroughly and efficiently, eliminating the need to rent ORVs for the inspections.
- To create a more diverse pool of contractors, the County Drain Commissioner met with the Hispanic Chamber of Commerce. This resulted in the hiring of a Hispanic landscaping company which has successfully completed several projects on County Drains.
